SCREENING & EXAM RECOMMENDATIONS

IMPORTANT: The Lions Club has partnered with your local school/preschool/daycare to assist with identifying those children at risk for vision related problems that can impact the child's academic ability and development. We utilize recommendations set forth by the American Optometric Association, The American Academy of Ophthalmology, and The American Public Health Association to provide vision screenings to children between the ages of 6 mos and 18 years of age.

If the Plus Optix device is used during the screening, note that, while the device is a very sophisticated scientific, clinical instrument, *it may produce both false positive and negative results*. It is intended to assist in identifying significant ocular conditions, which can impact your child's visual development and ability to learn. If the patient passes this screening but the parent or guardian have concerns, or there is an immediate family history of strabismus (eye turn), amblyopia (lazy eye) or ocular disease, **the child should receive a comprehensive eye examination by an eye doctor.**

It is important to note that Vision Screenings are NOT equivalent and do NOT replace comprehensive eye exams, which are recommended for all children at 6-12 mos of age, 2 years of age, 4 years of age, and then every 1-2 years during the primary school years.

IF YOUR CHILD DID NOT PASS THE SCREENING

Parent/Guardian Follow-up is Important! Young children with vision problems often are not aware that they see things differently than they should. A child's eyes continue to develop throughout childhood and vision changes can happen at any time. Early treatment can save their sight! Make an appointment with your eye doctor as soon as possible.

Payment Options: If you have a private vision insurance plan– check with your plan to find an eye doctor. If you have BadgerCare Plus– contact the recipient hotline at (800) 362-3002. If you have a vision care plan, request a list of eye doctors covered under your plan. If you have a HMO plan, contact your HMO advocate. If you do not have a private vision insurance plan or BadgerCare Plus, there are other options available to you, including:

- InfantSEE®: A national program through the American Optometric Association (AOA) that provides free eye examinations to infants 6 months to one year of age, regardless of the parent's ability to pay. <https://www.woa-eyes.org/infantsee-public>
- VISION USA - The Wisconsin Project: This program provides benevolent vision and eye health care to low income working families across the state. <https://www.woa-eyes.org/vision-usa-public>
- Aurora Walker's Point Community Clinic: This is an inner city free health clinic in Milwaukee that offers benevolent care by volunteer optometrists.
